It includes conserving coastal lands to give marshes and wetlands space to migrate as sea level rises. And it includes rain gardens, urban forestry, and efforts to de-pave cities and allow polluted runoff to be filtered through vegetated green space before entering tidal waters.

Rhode Island is well-positioned to lead in both these areas and we are already doing it. The state is a key partner in a coalition of 12 states that have agreed to reduce emissions. Rhode Island can proudly claim authorship of the nation’s first federally approved ocean plan and now the first offshore wind farm. Working with federal agencies and our neighboring states, we are piloting nature-based resilience practices along the southern coast with a view toward increasing the scale and informing policy and practice throughout New England.

Finally, the State of Narragansett Bay report says we must continue the science. Long-term scientific monitoring is essential to understanding whether our investments and interventions are working.

With rigorous and transparent science and thoughtful collaboration, we have brought rivers and tidal waters in Rhode Island to a better place. Inspired by this hope and guided by the same good science, we can be leaders in combating and adapting to a changing climate as well.
